

as their children started school.
Some of the original members
are still there but now they are
retired grandparents.

Like any group, membership waxes and wanes as personal needs change. I joined almost 9 years ago after I moved into the district. Initially, it was a way to meet people but now, having recently moved to Geelong, I will still travel to the meetings on the 2nd Wednesday of each month for 7.30 even though the drive home is late. Why?

I've found that the people in the group, women and the occasional man, of all ages, lifestyles and interests, bring a richness of ideas and outlooks. The books from the Council of Adult Education (CAE) provide the catalyst but ideas, sometimes conflicting, and often not something I've considered,

BANNOCKBURN GOLF CLUB

» As your local Golf Club, many things have happened since our last report in 2018. Most significantly, the transition from Sand Scrape Greens to fully Grassed Greens.

It has been well over 6 years since we last submitted an article to Bannockburn News and as such it is great to have 'our' local newsletter back in circulation. It has been sadly missed by us as a club, and we are sure many other individuals, groups and businesses. Welcome back!

This transition from Sand Scrape Greens to fully Grassed Greens started as soon as we played our last Sand Scrape Competition on 2 July 2022 after 50+ years on our course, the third course at Bannockburn since the first course was established ¼ mile west of the township. We moved to our current site in 1969 and over the following years have gradually developed the course to what we have today.

In August 2021, and following a very generous donation by a benefactor, Pacific Coast Designs was appointed to undertake the development of Course Master Plan and the detailed greens design to implement this plan. In summary, the Pacific Coast Design team concluded that the Golf Course at the Bannockburn Golf Club was a wonderful golfing experience, and the inclusion of grass greens would only improve the golf on offer.

The new green designs will see the course both be a fun and strategically stimulating test for golfers of all skill levels whilst retaining a balanced challenge.

With the transition from Sand Scrapes to Grass Greens, we realised that the long-term upkeep of the course also needed to be reviewed. With that review, we advertised and eventually employed David Johnston as our new Course Superintendent, our first ever full-time employee.

David's career began whilst he was living over in the UK in his late teens when he started as a summer casual greenkeeper at The Belfry Golf Club. Moving to Victoria on his return, he started at Barwon Heads Golf Club and then at 13th Beach Golf Club before taking up a position with the Metropolitan Golf Club in Melbourne. Moving back to Geelong, he spent another 2 years back at 13th Beach before taking up his position as the Course Superintendent here at Bannockburn. We are extremely lucky to have such an experienced professional leading a dedicated team of volunteers who look after our course and new greens.

Maude-Meredith Landcare Group Annual Rabbit Baiting (Feb - Mar 25)

Although they may look cute, the European rabbit is one of the most destructive environmental and agricultural animal pests in Australia. Rabbits not only damage gardens but pose a significant threat to biodiversity and agricultural production. Rabbits graze on native vegetation, crops and pastures, preventing seedlings from regenerating and reducing crop yields, while also competing for feed with livestock and native wildlife. Their indiscriminate browsing and digging reduces vegetation cover, undermines buildings and contributes to soil erosion and stream pollution.

The annual Maude Meredith and Districts Landcare Group annual rabbit baiting program will again run in February – and March 2025. The baiting program uses Pindonepoisoned carrots. Pindone, an anticoagulant that reduces bloodclotting, is regarded as one of the most humane ways to control rabbits. The Pindone is mixed with fresh carrots and then spread in a trail on disturbed ground either manually or mechanically for three nights, spaced three days apart. As Pindone is a cumulative poison it is imperative that all three feeds are carried out on the carrot collection days. There is an effective antidote to Pindone which reduces the risk to non-target animals.

In 2025 baited carrots will be available for collection in Maude between 2–4 pm on Friday 28th February, Monday 3rd March and Thursday 6th March. Carrots can be ordered in quantities of 5kg, 10kg or 20kg.

Everyone is welcome to take part in the baiting program, however the poisoned carrots must be ordered by Friday 21 February 2025. More information about the program, as well as a link to the online order form is available on the Maude Meredith and Districts Facebook page.



perating in a rural area, the small group of dedicated volunteers; based mostly in Bannockburn, Teesdale, Lethbridge, She Oaks, Maude, and Anakie; travel hundreds of kilometres each week to help animals in need. Unfortunately, not every call results in a successful rescue. Volunteers are also tasked with checking, relocating, and marking deceased wildlife, taking injured animals to the vet, transporting orphaned animals to carers, and even euthanizing macropods on-site when necessary.



In just six months, the team managed 509 macropod cases—an increase from 27 in December '23 to 168 in May '24—without even accounting for the numerous incidents that go unreported.

According to organiser Angela Sumner, many of these cases were discovered when a volunteer happened to be in the right place at the right time, but the team also handles a wide range of other wildlife

cases, including birds, possums, lizards, and koalas. Angela stresses the importance of raising awareness among drivers: "When wildlife is hit by a vehicle, it's crucial to stop and check for injuries. It's rare that kangaroos or wallabies are unhurt after being struck—often, we find them days or weeks later, slowly dying from untreated injuries. A simple phone call for help can make all the difference."

Now a registered not-for-profit with charity status pending, Bannockburn Wildlife Rescue continues to raise funds through donations and grants to support the volunteers. Angela is also seeking funding to provide firearms training and equipment for a local volunteer to safely tranquilise animals when needed.



of 176 pound 12 shillings and four pence, each stone having been previously numbered by the contractors, Trevenna and Gubby. Contrary to popular belief, Historian (Bill Morrow) at the Geelong Historical Records Centre (now the Geelong Heritage Centre), stated that the building was never used for the safe keeping of gold overnight. It was used to hold prisoners overnight awaiting trial before the Police Magistrate (Leigh Road Court of Petty Sessions).

The former lock up, Victor Street, Bannockburn, has significance as a rare surviving example of a 19th century bluestone lock up and a physical legacy of early law enforcement in the Golden Plains Shire. Initially built at Lethbridge in 1860 and dismantled and relocated to its present site in 1869, the austere building is a representative example of standard Public Works Department design as expressed in the gabled forms clad in slate, square coursed basalt wall construction (with each block being numbered), moulded timber bargeboards, broad eaves, small window openings with iron security grilles, narrow ventilation openings in the gable ends and the iron grille gate in the front porch. Internally, the original function of confinement and imprisonment is reflected in

the rudimentary and intact fabric, including the cobbled stone porch floor, timber-lined ceilings, timber floors to the cells, solid vertically boarded cell doors and white-washed stone walls. The relocation of the building to its current site has not diminished its significance. The lock up functioned on the existing site for almost one hundred years. It is in good condition and is predominantly intact.

The former lock up at
Bannockburn is socially
significant (Practice Note
Criterion G) as a symbol of 19th
century law and order in the town.
While no longer functioning for
its original purpose, the lock up
is recognised and valued as a
tangible link to the town's public
infrastructure heritage.

» We live in a complex world. While there is much that some of us will never understand about Information Technology, Economics, Politics, Mathematics, Physics and Chemistry, we really need to understand Biology because we are part of our planet's ecosystems.

Small is crucial

Life at ground level in the Inverleigh Nature Conservation Reserve

We rely on the healthy functioning of what we call 'Ecosystem' Services', without which, life on Earth would not be possible. Bees pollinate our fruit crops, flood water is recycled as clean rain by oceans and forests, plants provide us with oxygen to breathe and remove carbon dioxide, returning it as sugars, starch and fibres.

Imagine what the world would be like if dead things did not break down! We depend on a succession of smaller and smaller organisms to shred, eat, digest, break down and excrete dead material. These recyclers include large and small animals, insects, worms, ants, crustacea, fungi, mosses, lichens, bacteria and algae. The building blocks of living things, the flesh, proteins, fats and fibres are broken down into forms that can be taken up by plants and then animals to produce new food. Anyone who has made compost from their kitchen waste will be appreciative of this process which worms and microbes carry out for free.

In our local Grassy Woodlands, getting down on your knees and looking for the small things that are the drivers of ecosystems can be a real eye-opener.

In the Inverleigh Nature Conservation Reserve, the surface layer will usually consist of several species of grass, sundews, mosses, toadstools, mushrooms, lichens, and groundcover plants such as Pigface, Rock Fern, Saloop, Nodding Saltbush, Pink Bindweed, Kidney weed, Stinking Pennywort, Lilies and Orchids, Common Raspwort, Riceflower and Cranberry Heath. If you look carefully, you will also notice pellets of poo or scats from kangaroos, wallabies and rabbits, which will be breaking down to feed these plants.

Beneath this surface layer, but visible only with a microscope are fungi and bacteria busily breaking down any detritus into plant fertilizer to complete the recycling process.

If you can find a rotting stump or log, look carefully at what is happening. Insects are chewing through it, fungi are growing in and on it, and bacteria are reducing complex chemicals to simpler building blocks to be taken

up by plant roots to make new wood.

The trees and larger flowering plants may be things that catch our eye, but down below, it is the small things that make it all these possible.

BATESFORS, FYANSFORD, STONEHAVEN LANDCARE

» Our group has been working together for over 20 years, (some of us for longer), often with the support of the Shire of Golden Plains, the City of Greater Geelong and the Geelong Landcare Network.

ur aim is to protect, restore and manage Batesford's valuable environmental assets, especially the Moorabool River and environs, and preserve Batesford's 'sense of place' .Over these years our Landcare Group has worked with local Councils planting native trees and shrub understory for animal habitat and plant and animal biodiversity, and creating simple walking tracks where people can enjoy the natural world and removing weeds and invasive pests, whether they be plants or animals. We also have a weekly program working with schools, exposing them to the values and practical ways of caring for nature and introducing the next generation to the importance of doing this work.

GARDENING TIPS AND TRICKS

» When I asked what gardening topics people wanted to read about – Growing AVOCADOS was top of the list.

hen I asked
what gardening
topics people
wanted to read
about – Growing
AVOCADOS was top of the list.

I have personally grown them successfully at two properties in Banno, on very different soils. The first was sloped ground that tended to be very dry and free draining, with a rock base and shale chunks found everywhere, with little topsoil (the type of soil you generally see scrubby Aussie bushland on (think soil like Steiglitz). The other garden, was an open block with a newly built house on Banno's famous cracking clay = a layer of rock deep under an impenetrable depth of slimy cracking clay that swells into a sodden sludge that sticks to your boots in winter because there is absolutely no topsoil to keep it off your boots, then it dries out and forms cracks so big you could lose vour toddler in them over summer. But me being me, I grew avocados on both.

Avocados are a popular nutritious fruit that, apart from being the perfect baby food, are high in vitamin C, full of anti-oxidants, great for your skin and a good source of beneficial monounsaturated fats and folic acid.

The avocado tree is a large, shady evergreen tree that may be pruned

as little or as much as you require. They have a gentle weeping habit with lush, glossy, green foliage that makes them a beautiful garden addition if you're able to get it past the first five years where they are most susceptible.

Avocados are naturally a Sub-Tropical understory tree that grows in forests, so it is not usually in direct sunlight all day, so if your garden has afternoon shade – rejoice by planting an Avo. They grow well in NSW up to Qld along the coastline where good rains occur over summer and soak deep into forest litter (holding soil moisture and maintaining humidity).

The avocado tree is a large, shady evergreen tree that may be pruned as little or as much as you require. They have a gentle weeping habit with lush, glossy, green foliage that makes them a beautiful garden addition if you're able to get it past the first five years where they are most susceptible.

Avocados are naturally a Sub-Tropical understory tree that grows in forests, so it is not usually in direct sunlight all day, so if your garden has afternoon shade – rejoice by planting an Avo. They grow well in NSW up to Qld along the coastline where good rains occur over summer and soak deep into forest litter (holding soil moisture and maintaining humidity).

To grow an Avo successfully here – you need these things:

 Protection from burning sun and freezing frosts while small,

- Rich, well-drained soil with a slightly acidic to neutral PH ranging from 5.5 to 7.
- Adequate water (mainly in the growing season of summer).
- Enough warmth/heat to encourage flowering and fruit ripening.

So, to grow an Avo, you need to create a microclimate that matches those conditions. Once you've done that, Avocado's don't not need a lot of extra work – just good placement when planted, plenty of summer water and a few buckets of compost each year.

I created a microclimate by building a 70% shade cloth structure about 2 m tall, with shade cloth on the top as well as the south east and west sides and was open to the N. This protected the trees from the hot summer sun and the cold winter winds and helped hold in deep layers of compost and hay I added to create a "forest floor" effect, these deep layers meant my trees were planted into a large mound of free draining, nutrient rich soil, not dug into the heavy clay.

If you have heavy clay, I recommend large doses of gypsum and creating soil on top of the clay to create garden beds or tree planting locations. (note – clay is often a nutrient rich soil that is great for moisture retention. What it lacks, is soil porosity to allow plant roots to breath, but over years of building up on top of it with manures and hays, the earthworms and soil

micro-organisms will help you turn it into an absolute garden blessing).

On our large block I also planted rows of windbreak trees to the S, E & W to slow down winds and build habitat. But you can plant your Avo's on the North side of a building or fence so that the building slows down the cold southerlies and acts as a heat sink, just remember you want a warm northerly aspect and protection on the south, then add a bit of shade to protect from HOT sun and Freezing Frosts until the trees are tall enough to not be affected by

Avocado cultivars – what sort should I grow???

Avocado are categorised as A type or B type. But are partially self-fertile meaning they should set some fruit on their own if you only have room for 1 tree, but your yield will increase if you have one of each A and B (you can plant two trees very close together if you're short on space – they will compete with each other and effectively reduce the overall size of both trees, but trees grow like this in nature all the time).

There are many varieties to choose from but my pick for cooler areas are Hass (A) and Bacon (B).

Hass is an A Type and is the most popular variety and great in cooler climates. A grafted tree can fruit after 4 years. These trees are very large, up to 10 metres tall by 6 metres wide (in perfect conditions – remember that you can prune them to the size you want). They fruit between September and January with a sweet nutty flavour when ripe. The fruit is large, oval shaped with a bumpy texture

and dark green skin ripening to brown. The fruit needs to be picked in this time because it doesn't ripen on the tree. It will ripen once it has been picked within a week or 2, so pick a few each week and line them up in order so you know which one to use next.

Lamb Hass is also an A Type cultivar and is a newer more improved variety which is Semi-Dwarf growing up to 5 Metres tall and can be easily kept pruned to 3 metres. It also fruits within 4 years. The large fruit has a rich nutty flavour. This tree has the longest harvest time as, when mature, the fruit can store on the tree for up to 10 months. Harvest from November onwards.

Bacon Avocado is a B Type and probably the best cold tolerant variety! A grafted variety can fruit after 4 years. It has medium fruit which has a lighter taste. Unlike the Hass, the fruit falls off the tree once it ripens. It has light brown skin which is easy to peel.

It grows to 6 metres high and 4 metres wide and fruits between June and July.

How long before my avocado has fruit?

For a grafted tree you should start getting fruit 3 to 4 years after planting, not many at first, but by 7 years you should be harvesting a lot of fruit. For a seedling grown tree, it can take between 5 and 13 years before fruiting commences.

Growing Avo's from seed can be a great activity with the kids, and you'll often find them growing in the compost.

Why not give it a go?

NEWS FROM DR SARAH MANSFIELD

» First thing's first: welcome back Bannockburn News! Local publications are crucial platforms for informing, connecting and celebrating regional and rural communities. I'm very honoured to be contributing to this first revived edition.

y name is Sarah Mansfield.
Living on Wadawurrung country in Geelong with my partner, 2 kids, 6 hens, and cat, I'm a GP, former councillor, cricket fanatic, and Member for Western Victoria in the Legislative Council.

As a doctor, I saw that so much of what affects people's health can't be fixed in a doctor's

clinic. Access to healthcare and dental care is too often determined by someone's postcode and income, not their need. And many of the things making people sick has little to do with access to healthcare at all - it's related to our social and physical environment.

Like access to public and active transport, which is at best poor and in many cases non-existent in rural and regional areas. This entrenches car dependence and isolates people who cannot drive, limiting their access to work, education and services. Sitting in congestion isn't good for our physical or mental health and adds to air pollution.

It's hard to address any other health issue if you don't have safe and secure housing, whichcan be particularly hard to find in regional Victoria. The housing affordability crisis is driving people into poverty, out of their communities, and impacting small businesses and services in regional areas who cannot attract workers.

There are a growing number of households in our region who also can't afford to put food on the table, let alone good quality nutritious food. This has obvious impacts on physical health, but it also impacts mental health and the ability to engage in work and education.

Our health is intimately linked to that of the environment. With climate change and loss of nature, there are a whole range of health impacts that people are experiencing. This is something regional communities are on the front line of - we are the most exposed to severe weather events, drought, and changes to our landscapes.

A report released by the Victorian Greens has revealed struggling regional communities want state government action on low incomes, better access to healthcare, and affordable food and housing as ways to relieve growing cost-of-living pressures.

Energy bills were confirmed as the most significant contributor to cost-of-living pressures from respondents, followed closely by the cost of food.

Accessing healthcare proved to be one of the biggest casualties of

the cost-of-living crisis for people in the regions, with over half of respondents putting health needs aside because

they simply can't afford a visit to the dentist or doctor.

These are all issues that governments can and must do more to address. They are the reason I decided to get involved in politics, and are what I've been focussed on in my work in parliament. For example, I'm proud to say that a recent parliamentary inquiry into food security was the result of a motion I introduced to the parliament. The inquiry resulted in a comprehensive report that the government must respond to

It is an extraordinary privilege to be in parliament, and a responsibility I don't take lightly.

There is so much more to be done to build healthier and more sustainable communities, and I will continue to advocate for better public and active transport, affordable housing and food security, accessible health and dental care, and protecting our incredible environment forfuture generations to enjoy.

Curse the space behind the gates That is going to waste With piles of dirt and Stationary equipment


Drive over the curb Wait until I can turn Out the in, or maybe In the out

BANNOCKBURN CFA: PREPARING FOR SUMMER

» Given Fire Restrictions are now in force, the window for burning off as part of your property preparation has closed.

o, what to do with the green waste that accumulates over Summer? A pile of green waste (leaves, twigs, bark etc) is not in itself a fire hazard and if it is stacked neatly; away from buildings, it should not be an issue. However, take care with piling up lawn clippings as they can generate a lot of heat and should not be stacked with other flammable materials. You can always take your green waste to the Transfer Station at Rokewood if you are not comfortable having it around your house.

By now you should have your fire plan in place so that you and your family know what to do should your home be threatened by a fire. The CFA website has excellent resources to help you get your head around a fire plan. Check it out at www.cfa.vic.gov.au/plan-prepare.

As part of your preparedness for Summer, you should ensure that you have the Emergency Vic app on your smart device. The Emergency Vic app allows you to set up watch zones so you receive alerts should an emergency event occur in your watch zone area. It is an essential tool to assist you in enacting your fire plan.

Bannockburn Bush Fire Access

Bannockburn Fire Brigade have given big thumbs up to the

much-improved fire access in the Bannockburn Bush on a recent inspection.

Following an escaped burn off in the reserve in November 2023, the Brigade raised concerns with the reserve manager about fire access. Working initially with Friends of the Bannockburn Bush (FoBB) and Ballarat Environment Network and then with the new reserve manager; Western Region Ecological Network (WREN), significant improvements in fire access have been made.

WREN; in consultation with DEECA, have groomed back overgrown vegetation allowing our tankers clear and rapid access. They have reinstated gated fire access off the Bannockburn-Shelford Road into the southern block and improved the gates at some entry points. They've also upgraded the gate locks (we carry keys on our tankers) and put up maps and signposts through the reserve so that in the unlikely event of a fire in the bush, we can get to it quickly and safely. A big thanks to WREN for taking our concerns on board and working hard to improve access.

UP THE CAMP

» After World War I, my father and his four brothers, set up a holiday-shack at remote McLoughlin's Beach in Gippsland.

reat fishing is had there, and we had two boats. The hut was a tin building, with matching boatshed, redolent with the smells of fish bait, petrol and oil. Fittings in the shack were minimal; table, chairs, beds, cupboards, a woodstove and, strangely, a telephone, as all the men were bookmakers. 'Cherrylong 12' was the number! A can-dunny out in the tussocks completed the picture.

Over fifty years, family, friends and a few priests dad knew, stayed at 'The Camp', but our first stay there was most memorable. My brother, Frank, still in nappies, had never been out of a cot before. He kept jumping out of bed, coming over to our beds and making us laugh! Thumb in mouth, he 'twiddled' us with his little finger, saying something babyish like 'Pike-adoo, dippy dippy, up the camp'! That meant (we think) 'Frank Donovan, yippee yippee, up the camp'!! The more we laughed, the more he did it, and the more poor mum became exasperated. In the end we all got growled at by dad!

Odd bits of clothing hung on the bedroom walls. One night, we were settling down to sleep when a rat jumped out of a pocket, bounced on my bed, onto the floor and streaked across the kitchen into the cellar.

Heaven knows what dad did with the rodent, but we were all giggling our heads off (again) AND getting into trouble (again)!

The hut was lit by two lamps, and we had our own kerosene lamps to read by in bed, with a wick and a glass shade. The biggest lamp was a lovely petrol fuelled Coleman from Canada; 'The Sunshine of the Night' engraved on it. 'One thousand candle power'. The lamps made a hissing noise, and we drifted off to sleep to that soothing sound. Dad terrified us whenever he lit the Coleman, flames flaring out the top before settling to a good constant light. We often tore outside for safety!

We adored the many fishing trips, everyone coming home sunburnt and tired. Sometimes the men, using both boats, let out an enormous Seine net, dragging in hundreds of fish. One summer,

we encountered two weeks of rain, a full moon and a king tide. Marooned in the hut, all we could do was read, play cards, eat and get bored, watching orange and grapefruit skins from the tip bobbing past the door. Waves crashing on the front window, we prayed, and dad stayed very close to his whiskey bottle!!

Our next sojourn found the hut moved back 40 feet into the tussocks, onto Crown Land, the death knell for the hut. In 1967 it was demolished for a carpark and toilet block. It was a sad day when I went back, collecting a few items I cherished. Now, all I have are my memories...AND the Coleman Lamp, still in working order.
